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U.S. Senate Vote Descriptions **108th Congress**

SENATE VOTE 1. S. 476: CARE ACT of 2003. April 9, 2003. An original bill to provide incentives for charitable contributions by individuals and businesses; to improve the public disclosure of activities of exempt organizations; to enhance the ability of low-income Americans to gain financial security by building assets; and for other purposes. Bill passed 95-5.

NASW supported the passage of S. 476 because it was a revised version of the original CARE Act. This bill provides tax incentives for individuals who choose to make charitable contributions, but it does not protect faith-based organizations, which receive federal dollars, from anti-discriminatory hiring laws. In addition, this bill authorized \$1.375 billion in additional funding for the Social Services Block Grant.

SENATE VOTE 2. S. Amdt. 596: Collins Amdt. No. 596 to S. 1054 (Jobs and Growth Tax Relief Reconciliation Act of 2003). May 15, 2003. An amendment to provide temporary state and local fiscal relief that allocated \$10 billion to increase federal matching rates for Medicaid by 2.95 percentage points until Oct. 1, 2004. Another \$10 billion was evenly divided over two years, to be used by states and localities for health care, social services, public safety, education, job training, transportation and infrastructure, law enforcement, or other "essential government" services. Amendment passed 95-3.

NASW supported this amendment because it maintained a strong health insurance safety net for vulnerable populations. State Medicaid programs serve as an important safety net for Americans in need of health care services by ensuring access to critical health and long-term care benefits. Tight state revenues place severe strains on many state budgets and threaten to limit Medicaid at a time when additional coverage and spending is most needed.

SENATE VOTE 3. S. 3: Partial-Birth Abortion Ban Act of 2003. October 21, 2003. This bill amends the federal criminal code to prohibit any physician or other individual from knowingly performing a partial-birth abortion, except when necessary to save the life of a mother whose life is endangered by a physical disorder, illness, or injury. Bill passed 64-34.

NASW opposed this legislation because it encroached upon a woman's right to choose as set forth in Roe v. Wade. Further, NASW believes in safe access to the wide array of reproductive health services for all women, and the Association contended that the bill was unconstitutional because it did not include a health exception as required by the Constitution.

SENATE VOTE 4. H.R. 1: Prescription Drug and Medicare Improvement Act of 2003. November 25, 2003. An act to amend title XVIII of the Social Security Act to provide for a voluntary prescription drug benefit under the Medicare program; to strengthen and improve the Medicare program; and for other purposes. Bill passed 54-44.

NASW opposed this legislation for several reasons. These included the legislation's use of private plans to deliver the benefit and the revenues they would siphon off from services. The fragmentation of the risk pool that will result in higher premiums for higher risk areas or groups was also unacceptable as were the inadequate and complicated benefits structure and coverage concerning Medicare and Medicaid dual eligible beneficiaries.

SENATE VOTE 5. S. Amdt. 2937 to H.R. 4: the Personal Responsibility, Work, and Family Promotion Act: Snowe Amendment No. 2937. March 30, 2004. An amendment to provide additional funding for child care. Amendment passed 78-20.

NASW supported the amendment because additional child care funding is needed, not only to meet the needs of recipients of the Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) program, but also of parents who make the transition from welfare to work and those who are in the low-wage labor market.

SENATE VOTE 6. H.R. 4: Motion to Invoke Closure on the Committee Substitute to H.R. 4, the Personal Responsibility and Individual Development for Everyone (PRIDE) Act. April 1, 2004. A motion to end debate on an amendment to increase the federal minimum wage and proceed to consideration of the underlying bill (H.R. 4). Motion failed 50-47; needed three-fifths to pass.

NASW opposed the motion because the Association supported further debate on the minimum wage and other amendments critical to improving H.R. 4 prior to a final Senate vote. Amendments included increasing services to TANF recipients with hidden barriers to employment, such as mental illness, substance abuse, or domestic violence; providing greater access to education and training; and addressing the disparate treatment of racial and ethnic minorities.

SENATE VOTE 7. Motion to Waive Budget Act In Order to Consider S. Amdt. 3144 to S. 1248: Individuals with Disabilities Education Improvement Act of 2003. May 12, 2004. S. Amdt. 3144 would amend part B of the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act to reach full federal funding of such part in six years, and for other purposes. Motion to waive Budget Act rejected 56-41; needed three-fifths to pass.

NASW supported the motion to waive the Budget Act with respect to S. Amdt. 3144 because it would have compelled the Senate to vote on an amendment to fully fund IDEA within six years.

SENATE VOTE 8. S. J Res. 40: Motion to Proceed to Consider Federal Marriage Amendment. July 14, 2004. This amendment prohibits the Constitution or any state constitution from being construed to require that marital status or its legal incidents be conferred upon any union other than that of a man and a woman. Motion rejected 48-50; three-fifths required.

NASW opposed the amendment because it attempted to alter America's most significant document for the express purpose of precluding groups or individuals from its assurances of equal protection. Further, NASW was equally opposed because of the prospective intrusion upon the traditional authority of states in matters of family law.

U.S. House of Representatives Vote Descriptions 108th Congress

HOUSE VOTE 1. H.R. 4: Personal Responsibility, Work, and Family Promotion Act. February 13, 2003. To reauthorize and improve the program of block grants to states for temporary assistance for needy families, improved access to quality childcare, and for other purposes. Bill passed 230-192.

NASW opposed the bill because instead of improving the lives of poor families, it would have made it more difficult for parents to acquire the tools they need to move successfully from welfare to work. It limited access to needed education and training and services for hidden barriers to employment, such as mental illness, substance abuse, or domestic violence, and it failed to address the need for child care or the disparate treatment of ethnic and racial minorities.

HOUSE VOTE 2. H.R. 1350: To Reauthorize the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA). Amends IDEA to revise its programs and to reauthorize appropriations permanently for its part B programs and for its other programs through FY 2009. April 30, 2003. Bill passed 251-171.

NASW opposed the passage of H.R. 1350 for a number of reasons. One reason for opposing the bill was that it removed the current requirements that related services personnel standards be based on the highest requirements in the state applicable to a specific profession or discipline. This means that states would be able to lower the standards they use when hiring school social workers. In addition, H.R. 1350 would allow for schools to use the same discipline policy for all students regardless of their disabilities.

HOUSE VOTE 3. H.R. 7: Charitable Giving Act. To amend the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 to provide incentives for charitable contributions by individuals and businesses, and for other purposes. September 17, 2003. Bill passed 408-13.

NASW supported the passage of H.R. 7 because it provides tax incentives for individuals who choose to make charitable contributions, but it does not protect faith-based organizations, which receive federal dollars, from anti-discriminatory hiring laws.

HOUSE VOTE 4. H.R. 760: Partial-Birth Abortion Ban Act of 2003. October 2, 2003. This bill amends the federal criminal code to prohibit any physician or other individual from knowingly performing a partial-birth abortion, except when necessary to save the life of a mother whose life is endangered by a physical disorder, illness, or injury. Bill passed 281-142.

NASW opposed this legislation because it encroached upon a woman's right to choose as set forth in Roe v. Wade. Further, NASW believes in safe access to the wide array of

reproductive health services for all women, and the Association contended that the bill was unconstitutional because it did not include a health exception as required by the Constitution.

HOUSE VOTE 5. H.R. 1: Medicare Prescription Drug, Improvement and Modernization Act. November 22, 2003. An act to amend title XVIII of the Social Security Act to provide for a voluntary prescription drug benefit under the Medicare program; to strengthen and improve the Medicare program; and for other purposes. Bill passed 220-215.

NASW opposed this legislation for a number of reasons. These included the legislation's use of private plans to deliver the benefit and the revenues they would siphon off from services. The fragmentation of the risk pool that will result in higher premiums for higher risk areas or groups was also unacceptable as were the inadequate and complicated benefits structure and coverage concerning Medicare and Medicaid dual eligible beneficiaries.

HOUSE VOTE 6. H.R. 4281: Small Business Health Fairness Act of 2004. To amend title I of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 to permit small employers to form federally overseen risk pools to provide medical insurance for their employees. May 13, 2004. Bill passed 252-162.

NASW opposes legislation to create Association Health Plans (AHPs). Such plans would not be protected by state regulatory oversight and all state mandates regarding health insurance would not apply to these groups. NASW does not support this legislation due to the loss of all consumer protections and benefit mandates and the likely fragmentation of high and lower-risk groups with the attendant increase in costs for those most in need.

HOUSE VOTE 7. H. Amdt. 739 to H.R. 5006: Ron Paul of Texas Amendment No. 3. September 9, 2004. An amendment to prohibit the use of funds to create or implement a new federal universal mental health screening program. Amendment failed 95-315.

NASW opposed the amendment because detecting mental health problems early is as appropriate as detecting hearing or vision problems in children and youth, and schools have a unique role to play in detecting problems that interfere with learning and development. Proponents of the bill have falsely claimed President Bush's New Freedom Commission on Mental Health recommended mandatory, universal screening. Recently, the Government Accountability Office (GAO) concluded there is no credence to this assertion, and NASW and the larger mental health community do not support mandatory mental health screenings in schools without parental consent. Nonetheless, this vote reflected congressional reaction to anti-mental health conspiracy theories fueled by the Internet and conservative talk radio that sinister forces are plotting such a regime.

HOUSE VOTE 8. H. J RES 106: Proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the United States Relating to Marriage. September 30, 2004. The amendment prohibits the Constitution or any state constitution from being construed to require that marital status or its legal incidents be conferred upon any union other than that of a man and a woman. Amendment failed 227-186; two-thirds required.

NASW opposed the amendment because it attempted to alter America's most significant document for the express purpose of precluding groups or individuals from its assurances of equal protection. Further, NASW was equally opposed because of the prospective intrusion upon the traditional authority of states in matters of family law.
